Pictures of Despair

- Christianity appears to be dying ready to breathe its last breath
- its a sadly, familiar theme, often spoken of at the introduction to sermons!
- we know we should expect opposition from the world at large...
- but worse is the creeping death that seeps from within the church
- that's what kills the church!
- what could be worse than having human church leaders who are indifferent in faith and unholy in life?
- a bleak time when the light in the world turns dark
- The regime of Hophni and Phinehas was such a time
- yet even in such times God did not abandon his people
- he was there in both judgement and grace
- and at this time judgement began at the house of God
- Shiloh was a mess!
 - Hannah's prayer refers to the fall of the arrogant, the mighty and the wicked to those who contend with the Lord
 - not here the Philistines or the Canaanites, but, shockingly, the priests of Israel
 - worship is a farce at Shiloh: a worshipper is cooking his peace-offering when along comes a servant of the priests with his infamous three-pronged barbecue fork, which he dips in the pot and takes whatever it brings out...
 - the priests already had their allotted breast and right leg (Leviticus 7:28-36)
 - but before the fat is burned in honour of the Lord, the priests' lackey appears demanding fresh uncooked cuts from the worshipper
 - if the worshipper resisted it would be taken by force
- All that Hophni and Phinehas had was contempt for the Lord's worship and his offerings
- If that were not enough in itself there was even more rottenness in Shiloh:
 - the priests had sex with the women who looked after the worship centre....
 - everyone in Israel knew about it
 - it was worse than merely moral degradation they were introducing pagan practices into Shiloh
 - Eli rebuked them... but they ignored him completely
- It was too late for that:
 - the problem stemmed from lack of loving discipline from an early age
 - the seed of rebellion was not nipped in the bud
 - they had gone unchecked too long
- Here were the spiritual leaders of Israel who cared nothing for the Lord
 - they did not even know the Lord how tragic!

Glimpses of Hope

- But right in the midst of this spiritual and moral morass at Shiloh the narrative gives glimpses of hope - little Samuel
 - the Lord was at work providing a new order for godly leadership of his people
 - fan of "West Wing" current series centres round the race to be the next President... part of this was Congressman Santos vying to become the Democratic candidate for the Presidency... all the razz-ma-tazz, hype, balloons, colours, bands, shouting, stadium full of people!!!
 - that's one kind of preparation for leadership
 - in contrast to how God is acting here it was all very quiet but 'Don't forget Samuel.' (v.18)
- Verses 19-21 are not just an interlude about Hannah they also parallel and contrast with verses 22-26:
 - God generously gave Hannah three sons and two daughters 'in place of the asking which was asked of the Lord'

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- that's the way the Lord is
- no sacrifice we make for him will ever impoverish us
- he sees to it that we are never ultimately the losers
- Contrast is between Hannah's thriving family and Eli's failing family:
 - Samuel was growing, but Eli was very old
 - Eli heard bad news all Israel was talking about it
 - his sons had turned the tabernacle into a place of immorality and scandal a place of sin, which should have been a place of holiness
- This passage reverberates with a painful truth:
 - there is no guarantee with God's covenant that all our children will grow up to be committed believers
 - baptism does not guarantee to every child that they will walk in faith when they are older
 - there is nothing automatic about the grace of God
 - yet whoever comes to the Lord he will never drive away
- Why does God announce their judgement here?
 - he doesn't enact that judgement until 4:17...
 - because they have a chance of repenting!
- Part of the trouble is that people lie about knowing the Lord:
 - they lie to God, to the church, and sometimes even to themselves
 - we, the church are not always able to discern it
 - but God looks on the heart

Prophecies of Judgement

- Hophni and Phinehas did not honour their father, nor take on his faith
 - it placed them in danger
 - because of their sin, God had determined to cut them off
 - and he would use their judgement as a sign, as a pointer to himself to his own holiness and justice and faithfulness
 - what a sobering situation judgement is announced incredibly clearly, yet
 Hophni and Phinehas are so firm in staying in that rebellion that judgement will fall upon them they don't see or won't heed the warnings that are given
 - these men were leaders, so they had to be dealt with
 - who else could deal with them but the Lord himself?
- God's kingdom and people may suffer from arrogant, immoral, unrepentant leaders, but the Lord will have a faithful leader - he insists on it
 - the Lord will save those who are his
 - the gospel will not be silenced because of wicked leaders
 - but watch out if you are the one hindering his gospel in wilful rebellion against it and against the Lord
- Those who honour the Lord, he will honour
 - but his promises are not blank cheques
 - don't presume on the Lord's favour
 - salvation is not automatic
 - we must come in faith
 - we must know the Lord in our heart
- Lord, cleanse your church
- Lord, have mercy on your people
